Directions to our New Location

Chances are you've driven past Christ Lutheran on your way to a guild meeting during the last year. It

is located at the corner of Brandon Avenue and Grandin Road, cater-cornered from Patrick Henry High School. From I-581, take the Wonju St. exit toward Colonial Avenue.



Merge onto Wonju Street and turn left onto Colonial Ave / State Route 720 and turn right onto Persinger Road. Turn right onto Brambleton Avenue and then left onto Brandon Avenue. After 3 blocks or so turn right onto Grandin Road and immediate left into the parking lot. Coming from Salem, take Apperson (Rt. 11) until it turns into Brandon Avenue, past our previous meeting location approximately one half mile. Turn left on Grandin and immediate left into the parking lot.

Quilt Show Preparation - You Can Help!

With the Christmas holidays just around the corner, you may not be thinking ahead to April yet, but our very busy quilt show committee is, and they need your energy to help! Judy Bradley reports that we already have nine completed giveaway challenge blocks turned in and ready for display. Remember, they are to be 12.5" (unfinished) and you should use the yellow floral fabric distributed at previous meetings along with any in your stash. Also, you can be working on your 20"x13" challenge quilt, "How I Celebrate Quilting." Come to the meetings for inspirational questions if you're stumped as to where to begin! Make an effort to finish any quilts you plan to enter in the show. Help Ethel make yo-yos to hang signage cards. Or, if you really REALLY don't have any



time to sew anything except Christmas presents for the next two months, just talk up the show to family, friends, the grocery store checkout clerk ... and ask if they're interested in purchasing a \$20 business card ad for the show program. Nothing helps like bringing in money or interest in the guild and our show!

NICU Quilts for Preemies

We have received a request from the Virginia chapter representative for the national organization Quilts for Kids (QFK). While delivering quilts to Carilion in Roanoke, the hospital requested some

quilts for the NICU (neonatal intensive care unit). Because the quilts are for preemies and other babies, they should be very small: 22" x 24" or 20" x 22". They are a good way to use up scraps, and a piece of flannel will make them lighter



than traditional batting. This would also be a great way to make quilts for those in need if you can't make a quilt as large as our comfort quilts committee requests.

QFK primarily provides quilts for the pediatric unit at Carilion for children with long term illnesses. Lessons Learned

Earlier this month, my husband went away for a weekend, and so I decided to challenge myself to a quilting marathon. My goal was to finish as many tops as possible, baste the smaller ones for machine quilting, and prepare the larger ones for my longarm quilter. On Friday night, fueled by Diet Coke, I powered through until 5AM to finish one top. On Saturday, I finished three more tops and started work on a fourth, but found myself shutting down at 1AM. The experience inspired me to author the top five signs it's time to turn off the machine and go to bed:

- 1. you sew more pieces wrong sides together than right sides together,
- 2. when working on the antique machine powered by a knee lever, your foot gropes around the floor looking for a pedal,
- 3. you continue chain piecing for a good five minutes after running out of bobbin thread before you notice,
- 4. you count the same stack of pieces three or more times because you keep losing count, and
- 5. you start to wonder WHY your hobby consists of cutting up fabric only to sew it back together.
