Minutes of the July 10, 2017 Star Quilters Meeting

President Cathy Russell called the meeting to order at 7:02 PM. Our program was first, followed by our business meeting and Show and Tell.

Program

Program Chair Dawn Schaben introduced our speaker, Elise Dee Beraru. Elise, who is a lawyer and an award-winning quilter, spoke about copyright law as it applies to quiltmaking. She pointed out if something is in the public domain, copyright laws do not apply. Quilt patterns and art available prior to 1924 are generally considered in the public domain with one notable exception: Mickey Mouse. Disney aggressively protects its artwork. If you want to copy a design (artwork, a poster, a photo in a magazine) which is not in the public domain, it is better to get permission first than after your project is complete, or to defend yourself in court if you do not get permission. There is a reasonable expectation that someone who purchases a quilt pattern or book of patterns will make a few and perhaps sell a couple of them. If you plan to sell more than ten, you should consider getting permission first. Some copy shops will not copy patterns, even though the pattern states that it may be reproduced.

Business Meeting and Announcements

President: Cathy congratulated Salem Fair entrants and prizewinners, and she thanked members who worked as exhibit watchers at the Fair.

Treasurer: Treasurer Sue announced that our books have been audited and approved.

Ways and Means: Chair Vicky Kuhlman reported that our ways and means table sales netted \$100.50 this evening.

Membership: Attendance at the July meeting was 56 members and three guests. Two guests were visitors from Germany. Cathy Russell announced that our third guest and another young quilter wish to join the Guild. Those members present voted to approve the addition of young quilters to our Guild membership.

Library: Betty Tyree reported has added new books to the library and she encouraged all of us to make use of the library.

Comfort Quilts: Six comfort quilts and one soldier quilt were turned in at the July meeting. Betty Tyree is looking for patriotic fabrics to use in soldier quilts. Quiltessas will meet July 28 9:00 to 3:00 at Our Lady of Nazareth Church on Electric Road to work on comfort quilts. All are welcome to attend, either to pick up kits to work on at home or to stay and work with the group.

Hospitality: Gisela announced our July birthday celebrants.

It's Almost Round Robin Time!

At the September meeting, everyone who wants to participate in this year's Round Robin should bring a tote bag (not see-through) with a Center for your quilt. This could be a piece of fabric, an applique block, a photo on fabric, a cross-stitch, a panel, an orphan block. It's completely up to you.

What is a Round Robin quilt? A Round Robin quilt is fun, challenging, and exciting. Each quilter makes a center block and hands it over to another quilter to put a border around it. The new border might be plain, pieced, appliqued, or embellished. It might not even go around all four sides. Then the augmented center passes to a third quilter to add a 2nd border and so on to each member of the group. After the final round, the quilt top returns to the center's owner for finishing.

The Star Quilters version is simple: do rounds for 3 months with a random exchange each month. September: Bring your center to the meeting in an opaque tote, leave with a different one, and use the month to add the 1st border

October: Bring the tote to the guild meeting, leave with another, and use the month to add the 2nd border.

November: Bring the tote to guild, leave with another, and use the month to add a 3rd border December: Bring the tote to guild, retrieve your own tote with your center, and participate in <u>the big</u> reveal.

When you are working on it, don't let the center owner see what's happening to her quilt. Advice from anyone else is fine. Do your best work and try to honor the spirit of the center. If you must miss an exchange, get help. We might arrange an early exchange, or someone might do a proxy exchange for you.

What should you put in your tote?

- 1. Center: a pieced block, an applique block, a photo on fabric, a cross stitch, a panel, an orphan block. It's completely up to you.
- 2. Label (optional): A quilt label on fabric so each contributor can sign it, with a pigma pen or fabric marker you want for the signature.
- 3. Fabric (optional): Fabrics you explicitly want to include, or a backing fabric (clearly labeled so it doesn't get cut up).
- 4. Journal (optional): Indicate instructions, such as colors you don't like, exhortations to keep everything washable, or final size limitations. You can explain the meaning or inspiration for the center so we can better extend your vision. If a tote has a journal, each quilter should add a diary entry about their round.
- 5. Disposable camera (optional): for pictures of each step in the progress of the quilt.

If you've never done one, don't be scared. I used to get scared every month for about 48 hours, but now it's just exciting. Doesn't matter if you are a beginner or a master; do what seems right for the piece in front of you.


