

Starry Eyed Quilters July 28th: An Improvisational Round Robin

The Starry Eyed Quilters invite all Guild members to an Improv Round Robin on Saturday, July 28, 2018. We will meet from 9

AM to 4 PM, with a lunch break, at the South County Library at 6303 Merriman Road.

What is Improv patchwork? Improv has been described as working without a plan; problem solving; and freedom from perfection. We won't use templates or rulers. We will cut the fabric with scissors and/or a rotary cutter, or by ripping. We'll use our sewing machines to assemble the fabric into blocks, and the blocks into quilts.

Why do it? First of all, it's fun! Other reasons include challenging ourselves regarding design elements of color and line. Since we will be doing this in a round robin, we also add the fun of playing with our quilting friends.

Our guide to this project will be Sherri Lynn Wood's book, The Improv Handbook for Modern Quilters. Email Kitty at kittydelapp1@mac.com to reserve a place. Tools to bring: a sewing machine, an iron, a spool of light gray thread and several bobbins already wound, scissors, a rotary cutter and mat, a ruler (if you wish), a portable design wall (if you have one), and a large box, bag, or basket for passing fabrics to other members of the group.

Bring a set of fabrics with a focused group of colors and a range of values, with about 3 yards of large scraps and 2 or 3 pieces of fabric in $\frac{1}{4}$ yard to $\frac{1}{2}$ yard selvage cuts. Sherry Lynne recommends putting in a small amount of "rogue" fabrics, ones that clash with your main fabrics.

You will also need a yard of your "signature" fabric. You will add a bit of this fabric to everyone's quilt that you work on. It is not possible to chose a fabric that will "go with" everybody's fabrics, so don't fret about it!

Bring your lunch and any snacks or drinks you want.

The workshop is free, but we will all share the \$105 charge for the day's room rental. Questions? Talk to Kitty Delapp at the July meeting or write kittydelapp1@mac.com


If you've been working on a convergence quilt, bring it to Show and Tell on July 9th, even if it's not finished.

Scott Murkin has agreed to be the judge for our quilt show on Friday and Saturday, March 29 and 30, 2019.

Scott is a doctor and hospice physician in Asheboro, North Carolina. He's also a quilter. In Illinois, where he grew up, he watched his grandmother sew quilts and helped her by cutting out patterns. As an adult, he was sad that his children wouldn't have one of his grandmother's quilts. So he made one for his daughter, one for his son, and others for relatives and friends.

Susan demonstrated this easy process step by step and then showed pieces she had dyed 24 hours earlier. Members of the Starry Eyed Quilters then displayed the fabrics they had dyed, giving the audience a look at the wonderful and varied results that can be achieved using Ice-Water Dyeing.

President Judy McWhorter invited members of the board to the front of the room to introduce themselves and update the membership.

<u>Raffle Quilt.</u> Kathy Wickham has patterns available for the raffle quilt log cabin blocks, and 44 more blocks are needed to complete the quilt. Kathy showed the completed center of the quilt, which she plans will measure 96" square when finished.

Quilt Show. Judy Coffman announced that guild member Nancy Oldham will be the Featured Artist at the 2019 quilt show. The next planning meeting will take place on June 19 at 6:30 at the Church of Christ, and as always, all are welcome to come and help with the guilt show planning.

<u>Comfort Quilts.</u> On behalf of Ethel Simmons and Judy Bradley, Betty Tyree thanked those who turned in 8 comfort quilts this evening.

<u>Challenge</u> Quilt. Nancy Oldham revealed that the challenge quilt for the 2019 "Inspired Piecemakers" show is "INSPIRED MONOCHROMATIC." The challenge will be to create a quilt that inspires using only one color plus one neutral, using any subject or style that you choose, with a perimeter of 100" or less. Susan Kraterfield showed an example to illustrate the challenge quilt.

Vice President-Parliamentarian-Webmaster Susan Kraterfield, Publicity Chair Linda Badger, Events Chair Cathy Russell, Sunshine Chair Sue Thurston, and Historian Kelly Zuber had no reports to make.

Here's Your Quilt Show Challenge!

INSPIRED MONOCHROMATIC

When we have a quilt show, one category is reserved only for members of the Guild. It is <u>the Challenge Quilt</u>, a small quilt (easy for beginners to finish) inspired by a challenge issued by the Quilt Show committee.

In 2019, your challenge quilt will inspire viewers with the creative use of only <u>one color plus one neutral</u>. The chosen color may additionally be modified as a <u>tint</u>, <u>tone</u>, <u>or shade</u>. For instance, using red, you might add pinks and/or burgundy (plus the neutral). Your preferred neutral might be either gray, black, white or taupe. (You must include a neutral, but it can be a small piece.) The choices of subject and style of the design are yours to make;



styles include traditional, modern or artistic. Anything goes in the use of your favorite quilting or surface techniques.

The quilt must be less than 20" wide by 30" long; or a combined total of no more than 100" for the perimeter (adding the length of all the sides). Add the 2" rod pockets necessary for hanging, and attach a label with your name. Completed quilts will be shown and judged before the show, at the March 2019 meeting.

When you register for the "Inspired Piecemakers Show," please share, in 25 words or less, what inspired your monochromatic quilt design.

Cutting Mat Maintenance

Keeping a cutting mat in peak condition means this: Keep it clean! Keep it moist! Keep it flat! Definitely NO Heat!

Just as your hands need moisture regularly, so do cutting mats. Moisture can be leached out by fabrics, and losing moisture will shorten their life expectancy. Olfa (manufacturer of rotary cutters and mats) claims that self-healing mats love moisture and should be soaked from time to time. They say to soak your mat in a bathtub or large container, as it must lie flat, in a solution of $\frac{1}{4}$ cup white vinegar to not quite a gallon of cool water, for 15-20 minutes. Dry it thoroughly, but not in the sun.

Astronaut Karen Nyberg, who spent five months on the International Space Station, stitched together a 9-inch red, white, and blue square that must be the first example of patchwork made in space.

"It is far from being a masterpiece," said Nyberg. "I've discovered several challenges with cutting and piecing and stitching in weightlessness."

In addition to the problems of scissors, needles, and spools of thread floating away in microgravity,

"You can't lay things down and measure. I found myself taping the fabric to a surface, trying to lay it out."

But the time and trouble were worth it, she said. "It will be neat to have a quilt block I can say was actually sewn during my time in space."

File your fabric to keep it organized! You can purchase used file cabinets for a song now that offices use computers instead of paper records. Although it will take time up front, filing your fabric (literally!) will pay off.

Keeping your fabric stash organized will help you avoid purchasing extra materials. Filing it in drawers keeps it dust-free and less likely to wrinkle. And think of the happiness you'll feel when you can just grab-and-go to a workshop!
