


## A Challenge from the Starry Eyed Quilters Group

## Minutes of the Star Quilters Guild Monthly Meeting on August 6, 2018

President Judy McWhorter called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM. The meeting began with our program, followed by our business meeting and Show and Tell.

#### **Program**

Program Chair Dawn Schaben introduced our speaker, Leigh Ann Thomas, who presented a trunk show of her primitive and traditional quilts. Leigh Ann defined primitive quilts as quilts made in the Folk Art style often using inexact piecing (e.g., wonky flying geese blocks) and applique shapes as seen in children's drawings. She mentioned well-known quilters Kim Diehl, Cheri Payne, Lisa Bongean and Barbara Brackman as sources for some of her quilt patterns. Leigh Ann brought many quilts to show us. She intends her quilts to be used, and she hand-washes them. She uses wool, cotton, and sometimes linen fabrics, and Dream Cotton's thinnest batting (Request). Her quilts included hand-appliqued wool shapes, hand quilting using Pearl Cotton size 10, and cotton applique using machine zigzag and smoke invisible thread. Patterns included crows, jugs, flowers and trees, and yoyo baskets. Leigh Ann passed her quilts around so we could really examine them. I am inspired!

#### **Business Meeting**

Treasurer: Sue Berry announced that our IRS status as a charitable organization has been renewed. The guild's books need to be audited before the end of the year.

Library: One book has been donated to our library.

Comfort Quilts: Judy Bradley announced that nine Comfort Quilts were turned in at tonight's meeting. There will be a Comfort Quilts workshop in September, date to be announced.

Hospitality: Gisela O'Connor announced the August birthdays.

Ways and Means: Donna announced that \$70.60 has been collected so far. An additional person is needed to handle fabrics for Ways and Means.

Membership: Jennifer Adams announced our attendance at the August meeting is 55 members though only 50 signed in. She asked that everyone review their information in the new directory and report any corrections to her.

Quilt Show: Judy Coffman announced that the committee is making good progress. Additional help will be needed with publicity. The next planning meeting will take place on August 21 (third Tuesday) at 6:30 at the Church of Christ. Nancy Oldham reminded us of the Monochromatic Challenge to go along with our show theme, Inspired Quiltmakers, and she suggested curved lines, shapes, texture and embellishments to show inspiration.

Historian: Kelly will post both July and August photos soon.

Programs: Dawn announced that September's program will feature tips for preparing quilts for a longarm quilter, and October's program will focus on how to use fabric left over from a quilt to complete the room's décor.

## Closing

Following Show and Tell, the meeting adjourned at 8:12. The next meeting will take place on the second Monday of September, September 10, due to the Labor Day holiday on the first Monday.



Here's a recap of the meeting of the August 2019 Quilt Show Committee.

With 17 guild members present at the August Quilt Show Committee Meeting, the following were discussed:

- · Registration form reviewed and minor tweaks suggested
- Show Guide decision made to review the 2019 show guide at the September meeting in preparation for presentation to the guild members.

#### Subcommittee reports:

- Awards centers of the award ribbons are completed, streamers are in production, and an assembly date will soon be scheduled.
- · Bed Turning A request for quilts to display will be made at the September Guild meeting.
- · Challenge Quilts We are considering who will judge them at the March 2019 meeting.
- · Publicity We discussed the most effective and economical methods to publicize the guilt show
- Raffle quilt All squares submitted by September for assembly will be quilted in October. The finished quilt will be presented to the Guild and raffle tickets distributed in December.
- Registration forms will be posted on the Guild website in September and registrations will be accepted beginning in December.
- Security We will contact the security guard used at the 2017 show.
- $\cdot$  Sponsors and vendors A few booths are still available for vendors, and calls are being made; there will be varied levels of sponsorships for the 2019 show.
- The treasurer reminded committee members to turn in reimbursement forms for show expenses.

## What is a Bed Turning?

In a "bed turning," or "quilt turning," quilts are layered on a bed, then removed one by one as the narrator explains what kind of quilt each one is and shares its history and stories about its creator(s) and owner(s).

Rumor has it that quiltmakers used to pile quilts they had made on a bed in their homes, then invite their friends over to see the quilts and enjoy tea and cakes. We've never served tea and cakes, but audiences at our bed turning displays have been very appreciative about seeing such beautiful quilts and learning about them.

If you have a quilt that you would like to have considered for the Bed Turning, please take a picture of it and write a brief <u>description</u>, including these items:

Who made it, if known

Date made, if known (approximate if necessary)

Fabric(s) used

Whether the top was machine-pieced or hand-pieced

Whether the guilt was machine-guilted, hand-guilted, or tied

Any special information - remembering that it is the "inspiration of the piecemaker" that we wish to highlight at this year's Bed Turning.

The Timeline:


By the end of 2018 Turn in photos and the information above at the October, November, or December Guild meetings or by email before the end of the year.

<u>January 2019</u> Quilts for the Bed Turning will be chosen, with an eye to a *variety* of quilts and *good stories* about their inspiration.

<u>February 2019</u> Lists of volunteers will be compiled. We will need narrators and people to fold the quilts during the shows.

Wednesday, March 22, 2019 Check-in quilts for the Bed Turning at the Civic Center

We will be doing the Bed Turning 3 times each day at the 2019 show. We had an outstanding variety of quilts in 2015 and 2017 and want the same for 2019. Some ideas: bargello, miniature, feedsack, antique, vintage, colorwash, modern and art. Surprise us! You did the last two times, and it was wonderful.  $\sim$  Cathy Fandel
