Please Welcome New Members...

<u>Kay Pungitore</u> was born in Maine and has lived in Massachusetts for 36 years. Her grandmother knitted and hooked rugs, but no one in her family quilted and her daughter has no desire to quilt. Kay has an uncle who lives in Moneta and one day when he was leaving Kroger's he picked up a bunch of magazines to read at home. One was an issue of Lifestyles of 50+ for seniors and he read an article about the Star City Quilters in it, so he called Kay and that is how she found out about our guild and joined. In 1981 when Kay was single living in Massachusetts, she frequented antique shops and admired the quilts that she could not afford. PBS had a "Crazy Quilt" series on television by Penny McMorris. That series was the beginning of Kay's quilting learning experience and now she could make quilts for herself. [NOTE: Penny McMorris is the cofounder of "The Electric Quilt Company" with her husband.] In the 90's Kay joined her first guild and learned a lot from the other members. She is a traditionalist, likes to hand applique, but is also a scrappy girl and the more pieces the merrier. She is working on new techniques such as color combinations and free motion quilting. Kay says there is no end to learning and she doesn't get bored. "Quilts speak to us."

Louise has been organizing her stash and not saving anything less than 3x5, but her friend who makes dog beds takes the smaller scraps. Louise has other hobbies of cooking and has been taking a cookie decorating class on-line using piping royal icing. On Jeopardy the other night, she knew all the terms of the baking category!

<u>fisa Smith</u> grew up in upstate New York, attended the College of William and Mary and has been in Williamsburg for 32 years. Her in-laws live in Salem. Her mother did not teach her to sew. Lisa would walk to the neighbor's house for sewing lessons and she learned to sew clothing and home décor. PROGRAMMING/EDUCATION

DID YOU KNOW "Ouick Fix"

...There is a quick and effective fix for tiny tension issues that may appear on the back of your quilt when you are "free-motion quilting". If you are machine quilting using two different colors of thread for the top and in the bobbin, you can make a quick and nearly undetectable correction by using a Zig Marker (in a color to match the bobbin thread). Looking at the back of the quilt, note where the top thread is showing up in "little color picks." With just a light touch of the marker on the offending thread, the tension issue disappears. FYI, this is a top trick for a lot of the "big show" competitors. Everyone has tiny tension issues sometimes. Tuck this handy little trick in your toolbox of techniques and quick fixes.


