# Change in Financial/Treasurer Forms and Procedures A Note for Members who have Guild Income and Expenses

Guild member Richard DeHart recently redesigned the Guild's Income and Expense Vouchers so that members can complete them online and print them out to submit them to the Treasurer for processing. These one-page forms have the guild's new logo at the top. Please use the following procedure when you prepare the new forms for submission:

- 1. Use the bottom of the Income Voucher to hand-write any notes that would be helpful to the treasurer in processing the income to the Guild records. (The Membership committee has specific record-keeping needs and their Income Voucher form will be designed to suit them better than the form used by other members.)
- 2. If you are submitting expenses for reimbursement and the receipt is small in size, please tape the receipt to the bottom of the one-page form. Otherwise, staple the receipt to the back of the form.


#### A Winter Weather Reminder

# Minutes of the Star Quilters Guild Meeting on November 8, 2021

We met as usual at Christ Lutheran Church; however, the Church parking lot was unavailable that evening, so we parked with permission in the Unitarian Universalist Church lot across Brandon Avenue. Several reflective-jacketed members with flashlights guided us across the street at the traffic light and up the sidewalk to the back entrance to the Church; the escorts were available after the meeting to guide us back across the street. Thank you, Crossing Guards!



President Dawn Schaben called the meeting to order at 7:04 PM. She welcomed us and thanked us for the get-well cards she received from the Guild following her recent surgery. She also thanked those who served as crossing guards for our meeting before turning the meeting over to Program Chair Richard DeHart.



#### Program

Richard introduced our program speakers, Melissa and Todd Cassell of Fork Mtn Quilts in Rocky Mount. Both Melissa and Todd were high school teachers. Todd also served 21 years in the Navy. While he was away, Melissa made quilt tops but did not have a way to quilt them. Melissa created a convincing business plan to justify the expense of purchasing a longarm quilting machine, and Fork

Mtn Quilts was born. The business grew quickly, attracting customers from around the country. They took the next step this year, opening their quilt shop in August. They sell fabric and notions; they sell and service machines; and they offer quilting classes. Their classroom and ample design wall space are available for open sewing when not being used for classes; check their website for dates available and sign up in advance to reserve a spot. They offer longarm quilting services at the store; however, they are booked through the holidays and beyond. The classroom is used for Quilts of Valor projects on some Saturdays; sign up in advance for this activity.

Our speakers gave us a quick Fabric 101 tutorial. Quilting fabrics may be classified as basics (solids or solid from a distance) and collections. Basics come in quickly after ordering; collections take longer to come in, holiday collections must be ordered a year

in advance, and often a collection is not reprinted. The shop deals with five sales reps who offer a large number of fabrics each, so how does one decide what to order? Melissa's orders follow a formula of one-third fabrics she loves, one-third fabrics she likes, and one-third fabrics she dislikes. Fabric orders are currently about 60 days behind; Benartex fabrics tend to come in more quickly. Five lucky members' ticket numbers were drawn for door prizes from the shop. Fabrics were available for sale, including pillowcase kits for the Ryan's Case for Smiles project.

#### Business Meeting

Previous meeting minutes: A motion to accept the minutes of the October meeting was made, seconded, and approved by voice vote.

Treasurer: Sue Berry received recent income for the sale of Judy Byrd's quilts.

Quilts: Thirty-nine comfort quilts were turned in at the November 5 Quiltessas meeting. Two were turned in at this meeting.

Membership: Sue Thurston reported 45 members and two guests were present.

Hospitality: Chair Gisela O'Connor announced the November birthdays.

Library: No report

Newsletter: Editor Laura Perry asks members who are not receiving the newsletter to let her know so she may correct her email list.

Programs: Chair Richard DeHart announced that we will have our Holiday Social Pot Luck Dinner at our December 6 meeting at the Roanoke Church of Christ on Brandon Avenue. Please limit your show and tell items to those with a holiday theme. Instead of the usual holiday gift exchange, please bring finished pillowcases for Ryan's Case for Smiles. Due to Covid precautions, the organization will wash all donated pillowcases, so our Guild can skip this step. Our January program will be a round-robin of tables set up for presentations by Starry Eyed Quilters, Comfort Quilts and Row-by-Row.

Social Media: Nothing new to report

Special Events: Cathy Russell is organizing a three-day bus trip to Lancaster PA on April 7; contact her if you are interested in participating. Thirty-two people have already signed up for next year's retreat scheduled September 14-18 at the 4H Center; the expected cost is \$280. Contact Cathy to sign up.

Ways and Means: We will not have Ways and Means tables at our December meeting, but donations of fabric, patterns, books and magazines will be accepted.

Miscellaneous: Ky is collecting bar codes from packages of Hobbs batting. For every five barcodes, Hobbs will sell our Guild a package of batting at a discount. The batting will be used for Comfort Quilts. She has made a collection box for us to deposit any barcodes we acquire.

#### <u>Closing</u>

The meeting adjourned at 8:10, giving us time to shop the Fork Mtn Quilts merchandise.

# Starry Eyed Quilters


